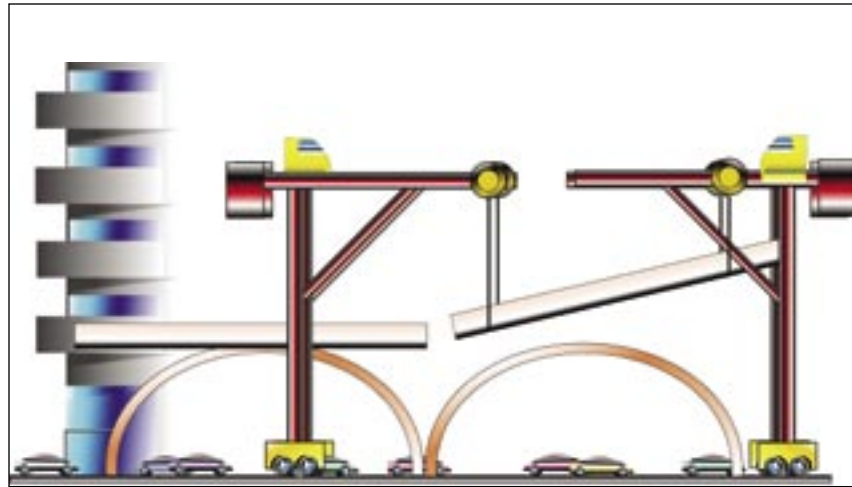
the projected \$5 billion to build and take much longer than the estimated 20 years to complete.
